NOW IS THE TIME TO INVEST

COMMUNITY COLLEGES ARE CUTTING COSTS AND REALLOCATING RESOURCES, NOT GROWING OR EXPANDING AS NEEDED.

Four significant budget cuts over the last decade have resulted in \$19.3M decrease in unrestricted state aid. The loss climbs to \$53.8M adjusted for inflation.

• BY2011: \$191.9M

• BY2019: \$176.2M

• BY2020: \$172.6M

• In addition, \$4M was lost to decreasing local mill levies since BY2015.

HOW ARE THE COMMUNITY COLLEGES CURRENTLY FUNDED?

The Community Colleges are funded from three major sources:

- State aid (approximately 60%)
- Local property taxes (up to 4 mills assessed in the home county for each college) (approximately 20%)
- Tuition and fees (approximately 20%)

HOW IS STATE AID DISTRIBUTED?

The primary distribution of the state aid (approximately 60%) is based on HB80 (passed in the 2016 legislative session) which recalibrate the standard budget every four years based on historical credit enrollment and costs. Variable costs (approximately 40%) are then reallocated every year based on performance metrics, but it is a reallocation, it does not include additional dollars. It is important to understand that the distribution does not consider the following cost factors, which the colleges must absorb:

- Costs associated with workforce training & educational attainment
- New program development
- Fixed cost increases
- Maintaining competitive wages
- Cost associated with compliance requirements
- Increased competition
- Inflation

HOW HAS STUDENT TUITION BEEN AFFECTED BY THE REDUCED FUNDING?

While each college establishes its own fees structure, tuition is standardized by the Wyoming Community College Commission for Wyoming residents, Western Undergraduate Exchange (WUE) & Nebraska students and non-residents. Tuition for all three categories has increased 53.5% or more since 2003.

The Community Colleges request the following:

- \$30M ongoing increase to the state-aid block grant
- \$28.7M continued investment in community college capital construction projects
