

WEEK ONE LEGISLATIVE SUMMARY FEBRUARY 16, 2020

The 2020 budget session kicked off on Monday with Governor Gordon delivering his second state of the state address. He highlighted the strengths of the Wyoming economy (increased population, lowest unemployment since 2008, growing GDP, and increased personal income). Here are the highlights of the speech:

- Modernizing the K12 funding model and what is included in the basket of goods
- Curbing capital construction spending
- WyOpen website in the State Auditor's Office and Wyoming Sense both focused on transparency
- Endorsing strategic investments in new technology and advanced cybersecurity
- Opportunities to train our workforce
- Legally fighting for coal exportation
- Bringing the next carbon capture and sequestration facility to Wyoming
- Coal market augmentation and preservation
- Invasive Species Initiative
- Migration Corridors Executive Order
- Support for a lodging tax
- Aligning post-secondary education opportunities with our workforce needs
- Support for Wyoming Works and the Higher Education Attainment Council
- Improving access and lowering the cost of healthcare

Yet, he was cautious with his remarks about the future of the state's revenue streams. The downturn from coal is hitting harder and sooner than we ever understood before and the Governor is aware of the augmented downturn.

Next week is budget week. The state is still upwards of \$400M short when it comes to K12 education funding. This budget diverts 1% of the severance tax to go into a special fund for two years and imposes across the board cuts in information technology spending to save money for this obligation. Both the House and the Senate will read in the budget bill on Monday and Tuesday and take second reading amendments on Wednesday and third reading budget amendments on Friday.

February 14th was the last day for bills to pass introduction vote and next Monday February 25th, is the last day for bills to be voted out of committee in the first house. See more deadlines at the end of the report.

Bill activity this week yielded failed efforts to bring about Medicaid expansion or the corporate income tax, as discussed in the interim. Yet efforts to implement a state-wide lodging tax and keno gambling advanced to the next steps.

BILLS OF INTEREST THIS WEEK

<u>HB 50 – Government procurement – amendments</u> – The bill modifies provisions related to procurement and contracting by governmental entities. The colleges and the WCCC participated in a working group over the summer to come to this language. Passed the House on 2/14.

<u>HB 95 – Building and construction projects</u> - Requires legislative authorization for expenditure of funds on state building projects and University of Wyoming capital construction projects as specified; revising requirements for community college capital construction projects. **The bill was laid back in House Appropriations on Feb 13**th.

<u>SF 119 – State funded capital construction</u> – this is the bill where the community college capital construction projects are appropriated. **The bill passed out of Senate Appropriations on 2/14.**

<u>SF 93 – Wyoming Works – application period</u> – The bill simply provides a fix for students who have previously been enrolled in a Wyoming Works program so that they may receive funding from the program. **The bill passed out of Senate Education unanimously on 2/14.**
