- ✓ Students see lifetime earnings increases that strengthen families and communities.

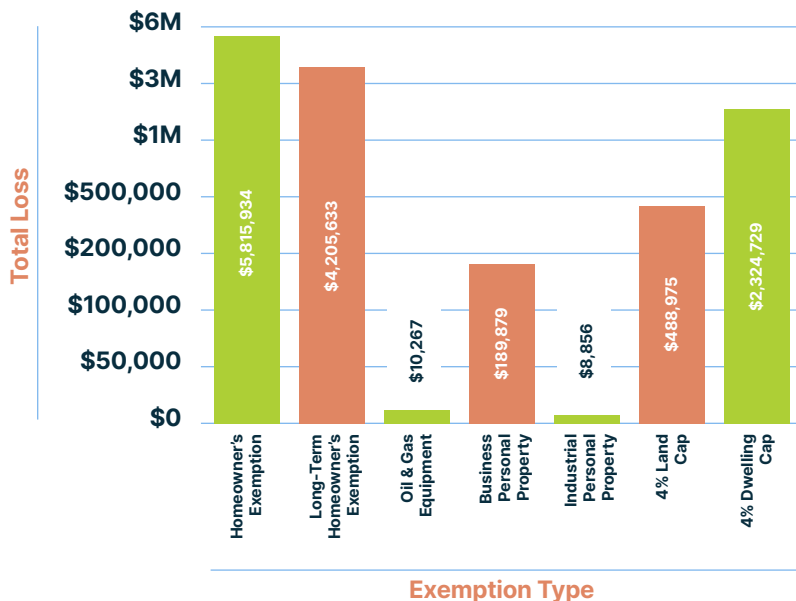
Taxpayer & Community Impact

- ✓ Reduced reliance on social services, increased workforce participation, and stronger local economies

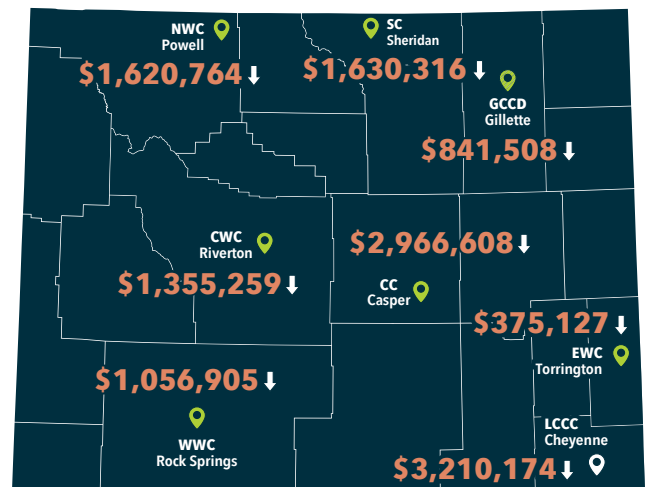
PROPERTY TAX RELIEF MEASURES → Real losses, real consequences

Prepared by Ken Guille-Department of Revenue-Property Tax Division. The figures were pulled directly from the statewide CAMA system on August 7, 2026. The mill levies reflect the amounts that are reported to the State Board of Equalization. The amount of loss from residential exemptions is shown. The veterans' exemption is not included. Other exemptions found in W.S.39-11-105 like religious, charitable, etc. are also not included in the totals. The levy for a voter approved bond was taken out of the final calculation for the totals.

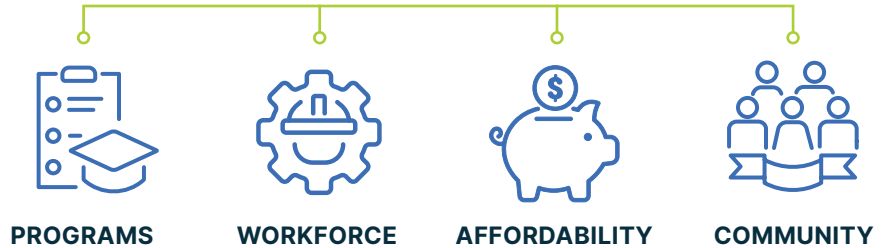

CITIZEN'S INITIATIVE #1

A Direct Threat to Community Colleges

The proposed ballot initiative would dramatically restructure Wyoming's property tax system. While framed as relief, it would further erode the colleges' most stable revenue source.

"What's at Risk?"



If Initiative #1 Passes, Wyoming Risks:

- ✓ Deepening the \$13M already lost from legislative exemptions
- ✓ Cuts to workforce programs in healthcare, trades, energy, IT, early childhood, and public safety
- ✓ Reduced ability for boards to respond to local needs
- ✓ Higher tuition pressures
- ✓ Loss of faculty and staff
- ✓ Fewer community services and partnerships
- ✓ Weakened rural economies that rely on their colleges

WACCT'S POSITION

WACCT opposes Initiative #1 because it threatens the stability, affordability, and workforce mission of Wyoming's community colleges. WACCT will continue educating the public about the real impacts of property tax reform and the essential role colleges play in Wyoming's future.
